

Joe is intent on cleaning all lubrication passages. Note the wire he is using.




Larry is driving out a pump shaft as Joe and Al hold the casting steady.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Ford Motor Company has one of the richest histories of any Automobile Company. This was possible because of the preservation of documents, photos, and short films. It is my purpose in the coming months to bring you significant facts of Ford history presented in short "bullets". Please join me in honoring our rich Ford Motor Company History.

The Model "A" Town Car Delivery (295-A)



This beautiful Model "A" Town Car Delivery had a naugahyde tire cover most had metal tire covers...

- Last month we talked about the Model "A" Town Car as one of the rarest Model "A". Even rarer is the Model "A" Town Car Delivery, Ford's most exotic delivery car.
- The Town Car Delivery was introduced in January 1931 as a new model, but some 1930 models were built before that date.
- Ford production figures show 1 was produced in 1930, 190 in 1931 and 5 in 1932 for a total production of 196 in the U.S. The cost was \$1,150. During the first nine months of production only 26 were sold and the remainder were sold into 1932.
- These vehicles had hand formed aluminum bodies built by Briggs Body
 Company on standard Model "A" chassis. It had an open driver compartment
 with a removable canopy. The rear of the Town Car Delivery had a wide rear
 door that made loading and unloading easy.
- The 1931 Town Car Delivery came with a full rear bumper, a fender mounted spare tire with a bright metal tire cover, cowl lights and a pair of outside ornamental lights as standard equipment.
- The interior compartment of the Town Car Delivery was also called a package compartment and had side trim panels and partition made of birch plywood and the floor was made of maple. They were both finished with Spar varnish.
- Behind the front seat you could find a full length sliding door, and inside, two
 interior dome lights, one at the head of the drivers compartment and the other in
 the package compartment.

- It had two front seats with a passenger seat that could be removed by the user. These seats were covered with black long grain leather.
- The Model "A" Town Car delivery could be ordered in any forty standard exterior colors. Due to the high cost and the economic crisis of the depression years production of this exotic delivery vehicle came to an end in 1931.

What Common feature do Some (Deluxe Level) earlier VW Microbuses have — that is like all: Model A Fords? Answer: A fold- open – front windshield.




BARBER MOTOR SPORT TOUR
