Model A Trivia

History of the Model A (continued)

Within a year, Ford relented and the research and development that had unofficially been moving toward a new model suddenly became official. Ever the pragmatic engineer, Ford decided that if he were going to build a new model, it should have a long life in the marketplace. With this in mind, he decided to zoom past Chevrolet and its six-cylinder engine by offering a V-8.

But when rumors of a new Ford began to circulate, sales of the Model T, already slipping, really hit the skids. To plug the hole more quickly, Ford decided to stick with a four cylinder engine, albeit substantially upgraded, and put the V-8 on the back burner.

Model T production shivered to a halt in the summer of 1927, after nearly 15,500,000 had been produced. Not only was it the car that put America on wheels; it was also the car the put most of the civilized world on wheels, through Ford's extensive export and overseas production operations. Massive Ford plants all over the world would be shuttered for six months while the new model went through its final stages of development. Since they were staring all over again, Ford decided to call the new car the Model A.

As development continued, Edsel Ford became the driving force behind the new model. He insisted that it be equipped with a conventional threespeed, sliding-gear transmission instead of the Model T's planetary gear set. He pushed for substantially improved engine performance. And he closely directed the chassis and body design to make certain the new car wasn't just better than the old one but more attractive, too.

When it came to styling, Edsel knew exactly what he wanted. He specified that the new model be styled like a "baby" Lincoln, the luxury car marque that he had been shepherding since its acquisition from the Leland family in 1922. While hardly "leading edge," the Model A that emerged until Edsel Ford's prodding was contemporary and handsome.



Brake Workshop: Adjusting your Model A Brakes

On October 15, 2011 The River Cities Model A Club members were fortunate enough to have presented by club member Joe Spooner a comprehensive lecture and demonstration of how to adjust your Model A Ford brakes. Joe used props as well as drawings to demonstrate how they work. As many as 5 Model A Fords were in attendance with their owners as well as a number of other interested club members. The event took place at Al Lugo's beautiful garage which sports 3 bays with one having a lift! After the didactics were presented we broke for a lunch of chopped Bar B Q, ribs and "fixings" which was elegantly severed by Lizabeth Lugo. Then it was back down to business! My car (The Pheonix) was the first to go on the rack. I was naturally eager to put to use the knowledge gained from Joe's presentation. We all got an opportunity to get under "The Pheonix" remove pins and tighten the brakes. Once he was back on the ground we "jacked" his front end up and made the final tightening of the brakes. We did the same on the back. Next it was time to check the performance. I backed him out of the driveway, reeved him up, took off and stomped the brakes! WOW! What a difference it made. He stopped on a dime (so to speak)! I wish to thank Joe Spooner, Al and Lizabeth Lugo for making all they did to make this workshop a terrific opportunity for the club to socialize and learn much more about our cars. This is the kind of club we are..... one that puts to *use all our resources* to help each other out in support of our club's goal to maintain the presence in our society of one of the greatest cars ever made!



Ford's Rustless Metal

O; Henry Ford didn't invent it, we are hastily assured by *Current Science* (Columbus, Ohio); but he "saw it first" for the automobile industry. This paper proceeds to give us these details:

"The new product is 'Allegheny metal,' and it is an alloy of the finest steel with about 18 per cent chromium, 8 per cent. nickel, and smaller amounts of manganese, silicon, phosphorus, and sulfur. Being steel, it, of course, has carbon in the mixture, too.

"An alloy, you remember, is an intimate combination of metals, to form new properties. There may be a chemical union, or a mere physical mixture, or combinations of both, in a complex alloy such as Allegheny metal. Not only the constituents, but the manner of their melting, mixing, and cooling, affect the properties of the final product. It is like making tasty soup there must be the proper ingredients, and a good cook as well.

"Allegheny metal was invented in Germany during the Great War as a type of armor. The British discovered it about the same time. Only a few years ago were the methods of making it in large quantities worked out, then Henry Ford made a contract for most of the American production. He uses about 1,000 tons of it a month.

"You will see this metal on the bright parts of the newest Ford cars. It won't rust, won't tarnish, won't weather. Being one of the hardest forms of steel ever invented, it won't scratch. Nickel, once the premier of bright metal platings, is hardly used at all to-day in the automobile industry.

"This is the second time Henry Ford saw something first in the business he is in.

"Many years ago he picked up the broken axle of a wrecked French racing car, and found a part of it to be unusually hard. He had the metal analyzed, and discovered vanadium in the alloy. Up to that time it was a secret with the French, but soon all the 'Lizzies' had castings at the ends of their axles of fingerthinness—but they never broke!

"They were of vanadium steel—the first light, tough alloy to be used in automobile manufacture."
