

#### Model A Trivia

History of the Model A (continued)

The changeover from T to A had cost Ford Motor Company the market share and sales titles (not to mention about 250 million 1928 dollars.) But the Model A quickly revived Ford's fortunes. By July 1929 more than two million Model A had been produced, and when the year was over Ford's U.S market share had rebounded from its nadir during the dark days of 1927 to 36 percent.

The Model A was updated in 1930, and Ford's market share jumped to 41 percent, but actual sales numbers were down as the first full year of the Depression took its toll. In 1931 sales and production fell still further, and it became obvious that the Model A would not have nearly the "shelf life" of its predecessor. During the year Chevrolet overtook Ford for the number one sales spot, and it became clear that the Model A's days were numbered. But as the car that allowed Ford to join the modern era, it was one of the most significant vehicles of its era.

Although the Model T was the best-selling car in the Únited States of America in the mid-1920s, the growing popularity of low-priced competitors forced Henry Ford to bring out a new product. The first Model A rolled off the assembly line in October 1927. It offered more comfort and performance than comparably priced cars and came in nine different models, ranging from the \$500 Tudor Sedan to the \$1,200 town car. By the end of 1930, Ford had sold over four million Model A's.

Paul Singer presented the "Cooling System in the Model A." He shared a number of useful facts about how to take care of your Model A and how the cooling system works. He stated the ideal temperature for the cooling system is 160 degrees. The radiator holds 1 ½ gallons of water. Oil is another important item in the cooling process. You need to use 5 Quartets of non-detergent all which should be changed every 6 months.

#### **Old Business:**

Mickey Timbes reported on the Christmas parade. Many cars from the club attended. Al Lugo commented on the Car Games that are available to look at at the MAFCA website.

New Business: Money has been approved to donate to the MAFCA Museum. Al brought up the suggestion made at the last Board meeting that we have an auction in January, where you will bring an item to auction that is worth at least \$10. Al also reminded the members that the dues for the New Year are due now and are to be paid to Bettie before 12/31/2011. There was discussion on the website. The editor reminded us that it takes entries by the members to make the newsletter and web site new and exciting. 

## **TECH TIP**

As we get older we learn to do our work smarter instead of harder. While setting up my new garage I decided to equip my parts cart with as many of the items I could use to make it more convenient. As the photo shows, I added a paper towel holder; an inexpensive towel rack to keep a clean tower that can be placed to protect a fender or any body panel when working on my vehicles. The cart also has a box of gloves, eye protection, a flashlight, jack stands, and a kneepad for when I have to kneel on the floor. Now, when I for example change my oil, I can role the cart to the car with all I need next to it.

On another sad note, PLEASE ALWAYS THINK SAFETY FIRST when working on your car. Not Long ago, I received an E-mail from a sister club in Alabama stating that a member of the Scenic City Model A club in Chattanooga recently lost his life when his Model A fell on him. He had jacked up his car without wheels on, using a floor jack under the rear end. He had jack stands next to the car but did not use them. Getting under the car without adequate support is dangerous. Always use jack stands, ALWAYS THINK SAFETY FIRST.

### How the A got its Name and a little more triva

The name Model A was first used by Ford in 1903 and also known as the "Fordmobile". This was the first vehicle produced by the Ford Motor Company and its first owner was Dr. Ernst Pfenning of Chicago, Illinois who purchased the Model A on July 23, 1903. Production of the first generation Model A lasted from 1903 through 1905 with 1750 examples being produced.

Automobile production was new and experiments with design, techniques, and technology were still being experimented with. Many early producers of the automobile had been in either the coachbuilding business or the bicycle business. Upon the invention of the automobile, they switched to the production of horseless carriages.

Henry Ford had \$28,000 in investment capital to begin his new business. Upon completion of his first motorcar, he had spent all but \$223.65. The Model A's were available as either a two-seater runabout or a four-seater tonneau. A flat-2 engine was horizontally-mounted midship and capable of producing 8 horsepower. A three-speed planetary transmission was mated to the engine. Dimensions and weight varied but the advertised top speed of the vehicle was about 45 miles per hour. The base price was \$750 and was available with options such as a rear seat for \$100. A rubber roof would set the buyer back an additional \$30 while the leather roof was \$50.

The Model A was replaced by a sequence of 'letter cars' until Ford produced the perfect combination of accordability and reliability with the Model T. It was mass produced and by 1914 the adaptation of the assembly line streamlined the process even further. By the 1920s, Ford had mobilized the United States with their customers wanting more and willing to pay more for it. Chevrolet's were becoming popular because they were similar to the Ford but offered a few extra amenities at a slightly higher but still reasonable price. Near the close of the 1920's and after sales began to slip, Ford realized that a replacement was needed.

So as production came to a close for the Model T, Henry Ford halted all production for six months to retool the equipment and prepare for the production of the Model A. The second generation of the Ford Model A began on October 20th, 1927. Sale of the Model A began on December 2nd, 1927 and was offered in four colors. The Model had been available in the United States only in black because it dried the fastest.

The public eagerly awaited the sale of the Model T's replacement and were not disappointed. It was a stylish and elegant vehicle, which had been designed by Henry Ford's son, Edsel. In comparison to its predecessor, it was more sophisticated and complex.

The cost of the second generation Model A, produced 24 years after the original Model A was sold for \$365 less, with price ranging from \$385 through \$570. The car was powered by an L-head 4-cylinder engine with just over 200 cubic-inches in displacement. A three-speed sliding gear transmission with 1 reverse speed was used. Top speed was achieved a little over sixty-miles per hour with the average fuel mileage being rather exceptional at over 40 MPG.

Just like the Model T, the Model A was available in multiple configurations such as the top of the line Fordor in either 2 or 3 window, Victoria, Station Wagon, Truck, Town Car, Convertible Cabriolet, Phaeton, Business Coupe, Sport Coupe, Roadster Coupe, and Coupe to name a few.

During the production lifespan of the Model A, lasting until August 31, 1931, Ford produced 4,320,446 Model A's. It was replaced by the Model B.

### The first traffic light!

### Joe's Tip Corner

### Does your bumper have a good coat of wax?

Why?? Iron will rust under chrome if moisture gets to it. A voluble spot is the back side of the rear bumper on the passenger side. This is due to being close to the exhaust heat and moisture coming from the tail pipe.

Solution - Clean the front and back of both the upper and lower bars of the bumper with a chrome polish and then apply a heavy coat of paste wax.

Do this approximately every six months.
