Opening:

The regular meeting of The River Cities Model A Ford Club was called to order at 6:00 pm on March 15, 2012 at the Woodman of The World Lodge by President Al Lugo. He then led the group in The Pledge of Allegiance. The blessing was given and all proceeded to the buffet.

Al Lugo called the meeting to order and welcomed the new member: David Black. Mr. Black was instrumental in inspiring Mickey and Jim to create this club. Also another member under the weather is Louie Willett who recently had back surgery.

Approval of Minutes: A motion was made to accept the minutes as written in the Newsletter by Bobbie Penny. Jo Spooner seconded it. The members unanimous approved the motion.

Treasurers Report:

The treasurer's report was read by Bettie Jackson and a motion by John Robertson to accept the report was made. Howard Ruddrick seconded the motion and it was unanimously approved. Program:

She then went around to each individual and took a picture of them to add to the medical history. This information was to be put in the supplied yellow folder and placed in the glove box of your car. A yellow sticker would be applied to the rear window of the car to alert emergency personnel that these documents are available and aid them in identifying victims and their needs. The program was well received by membership.

Old Business:

Those folks with outstanding balance on dues will be sent a final letter this evening. The trip to the Talladega Speedway & Motorsport Museum was attended by 5 persons from the club in their Model A's. Pictures of the participants and their cars were passed around for all to see. They received a police escort from Oxford to Talladega and onto the track. A nice article was written up in the local newspaper "Daily Home.com" on the front page. The survey distributed at the last meeting has been completed by 17 persons. The tally of these results will be discussed at length at the next meeting. Howard Ruddrick was given the opportunity to discuss the upcoming sing along for the May meeting. Mickey Timbes, one of the committee member's in charge of putting on the program, states she is arranging song lyrics information on the period. Dona Carter offered the resources of a Song Book for the 20-30's. Sharon showed the group the dresses and accessories she has been collecting for the Clothing Closet in an effort to give all ideas for dressing in period dated clothing for this meeting.

New Business:

Suggestions received from the last meeting were discussed. Al Lugo stated one of the suggestions was to provide a comprehensive list of the names of tours for the upcoming. 

Model A Q&A's

Let's Restore a Model A Ford!

Part 2: Break it down!

Now that you have decided to Restore your Model A Ford, its time to get the wrenches out and get dirty. If you read last month, you already know where you are going to work, where you are going to store everything, and where you are going to get all the new parts. Now get out there and get at it!

Drain Everything.

Remove all the fuel, oil, lubricant from the rear end, transmission, steering gear. Drain the water from the radiator. Remove all the important papers from the inside of the car, and put them away somewhere safe, along with the license plate. Dispose of all these hazardous wastes properly, and in accordance to local ordinances. We use a company called "Safety Kleen" to dispose of all our oils, solvents, and coolants.

Remove the easy stuff first.

You can spend the first couple of hours removing the hood, fenders, running boards, bumpers and radiator. This will give you a quick feeling of accomplishment seeing your car fall away so quickly. Once all the easy stuff is off, the real work begins. Disassemble the hood at the rods; remove all the rubber blocks and corners.

Next, the not so easy.

Removing the doors is often a real job. Those hinge pins have been in there for 80 years, and can be really stubborn. The trick is to be careful not to destroy anything you might need later. There is a special tool available to remove the pins, but it rarely works. On the really stubborn pins, I like to grind the top of the pin away, and then drive the pin down with a long punch and a small hammer. Then a large hammer. Then a torch.

Upholstery, Floorboards, Wood.

All the upholstery needs to be removed from the car. This includes all the panels, windlass, headliner, kick panels, and seat covers. Remove every screw, clip and nail, as they will all be in the way later. You can save the panels for patterns, but you really won't need them, since you will be ordering a new kit. Now is a good time to inspect the wood. On Fordors, Cabriolets and some other models, the wood is a structural part of the car, and must be in excellent condition. On Coupes, and Tudors, most of the body wood is for holding the upholstery, but it still needs to be solid. All cars must have an excellent header, top bows, and top wood. Don't scrimp on the wood. Now remove the seat carriers, floorboards, sill plates. Inspect the sub rails for any rust out.

Glass,

Of course you really need to be careful when dealing with glass. Always use gloves, and handle with care. The glass will need to be replaced, so the emphasis here is on personal safety. Most of the time the door window trim is removed, then the glass is rolled up far enough to remove it from the track, and lifted out. Wrap the glass with paper and save it for patterns. The Windshield will be in a metal frame, which must be disassembled completely to be restored. Remove all screws, and use a wooden block against the frame, and a hammer to bump the frame apart. Remove the glass, along with all bedding rubber and sealant. Remove all the window regulators and door hardware. Each regulator and door latch will need to be rebuilt back to perfect working condition. Quarter and rear windows are removed by taking off the interior trim pieces.

Top,

Like the upholstery, you will need to completely remove the top. Remove all the top decking, batting, canvas, chicken wire, hid'em, sealants, nails, and screws. Again, carefully check that wood, and replace it if there is any doubt.

Gas Tank, Firewall,

Strip all the electrical and fuel system components off the firewall. Remove the cowl band, cowl lacing, and remove the gas tank, by removing all the attaching screws, and lifting the tank from the cowl section. (On Some Models, the Gas tank comes from under the cowl top) Now the body should be nothing but an empty hull. Take lots of pictures.

Body Snatchers,

Remove all the body hold-down bolts, and rear bumper bracket bolts. Now find 5 or 6 strong friends, and remove the body from the chassis. Load the body, fenders, aprons, all the sheet metal in the back of your truck and head to the media blaster. Or spend the next few weeks stripping and sanding all the paint off it yourself. They do say that sanding builds Character.
