Program:

Tonight's program is being presented by Lester Russell on "Overflow" Systems for the Model A" He started out by saying that the purpose of making the cooling system one of a pressurized was to raise the boiling point such that it stops overflow and to guit from having to add water to the radiator all the time. He went through the step by step method of prepping the existing radiator checking it for leaks. He had a poster prepared to show how the steps are managed. He stated that he did it for his car and has been very pleased. He has also assisted 2 other car club members convert their cars. Russell stated that whole procedure should cast around \$200 for parts. After answering questions he passed around the parts he used to construct the system. The program was well received.



Let's Restore a Model A Ford, Part 6: Restoring the Frame

Now that we have the body out of the way, its time to start on the Chassis of our Model A Ford. A properly restored chassis makes all the difference in how the finished car will drive. Careful restoration techniques employed here will really pay off in the years to come. We'll break down this project into sections, with the idea that everything will come together in a really nice undercarriage. This month we'll look at the Frame.

The Frame: Take some time to carefully inspect your frame. There are differences between 1928-'29, and 1930-'31 frames. The radiator mounting pad is in a different position for the earlier frames, setting the bottom of the radiator level with the top of the frame rails through 1929. The '30-'31 frames have the radiator pad about $1/2^{\prime\prime}$ below the top of the frame rails. There are also some extra body mounting brackets on the later 1931 frames. You might want to check this if you are unsure of your frames origin. There is a serial number on the frame, on top of the rail between the battery box location, and the engine mount location, on the drivers side. These numbers may or may not be possible to read. Some cars also have numbers on the center cross member. To get started on your frame restoration, first remove all the bumper brackets, engine mounts, battery box, brake cross shafts, and assorted nuts and bolts. If you have not done so already, sandblast the frame to remove all dirt, rust and scale. If there are any cracks in the frame you will be able to see them at this time. Cracks are likely to form around leaf spring mounts, and close to the engine mount locations. To make an effective repair, you need to grind down into the crack with an angle grinder. Go about half way through the metal on each side, making a "V" in the metal. Now use a welder to fill in the cracks. Afterwards you can grind off the excess welds to bring the metal down smooth again. I do not recommend welding in extra plates on top of the frame, as they always cause interference during reassembly, plus can be unsightly on the finished product. Use a straight edge to check the frame for "Sagging". Frames are usually sagged over the motor mount areas. You may need to use a press to straighten the frame. Now use a tape measure to check the frame for square. Measure in an "X" pattern across the top of the frame. This can be tweaked with a come-along chain hoist. Another area on the frame you should think of are the bolt holes. If the shocks, steering, or any other component has been allowed to run loose over the years, the bolt holes will be worn out of round. This can be repaired by welding and re-drilling. Sometimes the


frame horns on the front of the frame will be bent or damaged. The outside of the frame at the frame horns should be a straight line, you can also check this with your straight edge. A few licks with a 3 pound hammer will move the frame horns back into position. This will assure that your front bumpers will set straight on the car. If your frame horns are broken completely off, there are replacements available. The frame cross members are installed with rivets. Check for missing rivets. New rivets are available, and can be installed with new rivet setting tools and an air hammer. Do not weld the cross members in, as the frame is designed to flex under the car. If you weld the frame together, the finished car will creak and groan on uneven road surfaces. After you have completed the repairs, the frame should be painted with gloss black enamel. Next month we'll work on the front and rear ends.





"The Spokesman" about Ethanol, and its use in Model A Fords. Here are a few things to look out for...

The cork float in the fuel gage will deteriorate in a few months. You will need to replace this with a brass float, available from Mike's "A"Fordable parts. This is

fairly easy to replace, and we replace most of the fuel gage floats in any car that comes though the shop.

Ethanol will attack any plastic parts as well, so do away with any plastic fuel filter you may have installed, including the "Micro-Filter" that goes in your sediment bowl.

Ethanol has a much lower boiling point, so you may notice that your car does not run smoothly in the summertime, especially after the car is shut off on a hot day, such as when stopping for gas, then restarting after a few minutes. The car will "Vapor Lock" because of fuel boiling in the fuel lines and carburetor. The fuel will cool off as fresh fuel arrives from the tank, and the car will run normal again after a few minutes.

The worst offence of Ethanol occurs when the car is parked for more than a couple of weeks. Fuel will begin evaporating in the gas tank, and carburetor, which leaves a very sticky, acidic residue in the fuel system. The residue looks like molasses, and really does a job stopping up jets, fuel lines and other orifices. The only way to repair this is to drain the tank, disassemble the fuel system, clean and rebuild everything. This can be a several hundred dollar job.

So I suggest if you do have a source for Ethanol Free Gasoline, that you use it in your Model A. Especially if you think the car may be sitting for an extended period. I have heard that Premium fuel does not contain as much Ethanol as Regular, so at least start using the Premium if you can.

If you drive your car daily, and have swapped out your cork fuel gage float for brass, and have an original fuel system otherwise, you will probably not have any problems."

GPS for a Model A with a 6 Volt System

Have you wanted the convenience of a GPS in your Model A with a 6 Volt System?

An easy solution is to use a small 12 Volt motorcycle battery. Such a battery is

the GT4LBS distributed by Ozark Automotive. This miniature battery measures only 2-3/4 in wide x 4-1/2 in long x 3-1/2 in high. It fits neatly in the space behind the gear shift and the front seats. This battery is popular and available from auto suppliers like O'Reilly. It can be put in a plastic case for convenience.

A female cigarette adapter purchased separately allows quick hookup and disconnect so the GPS can be taken out for use in your modern car.

The GT4LBS battery can be recharged at 0.3A for 5-10 hours or 0.6A for 3hours. A trickle charger from Harbor Freight works just fine. With the GPS you will know where you are at all times and you can compare your speedometer to it.
