
Model A Timeline

Oil Pan Installation

When installing an oil pan with the Model A resting on jack stands that limit your working room to muscle the pan up into place, try the following: For pan alignment use the four pins recommended by Joe Spooner in his Tech Tip. After lifting the pan with a floor jack or other means to within 2 or 3 inches of the bottom engine flange, attach one or two long cable ties through mating pan and engine flange bolt holes on each side of the pan. You will be surprised how easily the cable ties can hoist the pan perfectly into place on the alignment pins. The pan bolts can then be put in place without any straining on your part! Remove the cable ties and install the last bolts. Have Great 'A' Day!

Of our MAFCA Group we had Louie & Gloria, Paul & MaryNelle, Neal & Carolyn, Bobby Penny and Bob Smith. 3 Model "A"s, 63 Galaxy XL and 65 Mustang -so we had quite a parade driving down there.
