What does the A and W stand for in A & W Root Beer?

One hot day in June of 1919, in Lodi, California, an entrepreneur named Roy Allen mixed up a batch of creamy root beer and sold the first frosty mug of this delightful beverage for one nickel. Now, seventy years later, A&W Root Beer is the world's number one selling root beer and is still made fresh daily and sold at hundreds of A&W Restaurants.

Allen purchased the formula for his root beer from a pharmacist in Arizona. To this day, the unique blend of herbs, spices, barks and berries remains a proprietary secret.

With the success of his first root beer stand in Lodi, Allen soon opened a second stand in nearby Sacramento. It was there that what is thought to be the country's first "drive-in" featuring "tray-boys" for curb side service, opened up.

In 1922, Allen took on a partner, Frank Wright, an employee from his original Lodi location. The two partners combined their initials - "A" for Allen and "W" for Wright and formally named the beverage, A&W Root Beer, Three units were opened in Sacramento, then on to other northern and central California locations and to the states of Texas and Utah.

How any cars did Ford Motor Company, in peak season was able to manufacture ?

The amount of cars that Ford was able to produce per day still amaze people. By 1926 Ford Motor Company production lines, were able to produce 6,004 cars a day. Which means 240 cars per hour or 4 cars per minute; with a labor force of 80,000 employees, making \$5.00 a day.

Why Weren't Model A's Offered in Black in 1928-29?


Black was a special order color, not standard, at least when the Ford Model A was introduced. Most of the high end cars were black, as a luxury item. When the 1928's came out, each passenger car body style was offered in a minimum of five color combos, black not being one of them. (Yes, black could be ordered, but wasn't included in the initial releases). Often this myriad of options on a low-priced car was achieved by simply reversing the upper and lower body colors. Nevertheless, there were color combinations offered. Why wasn't black one of these options? What happened to black? To answer that, we need to look back a couple years in FoMoCo history before the Model A was introduced. Black had been the only color available on Model T's from 1915 to 1925. Green, red and blue had been available on Model T's up to that time, as well as black. Why then were Fords after 1914 painted only black for the next 11 model years? - The pigmented colors of the day took longer to dry than black. Until better, faster drying proxylin colors came out in the later 20's, black was chosen by Ford as the only color. A dry car body was a car body ready to mount on a chassis and sell! That meant it had to be black. Until the middle 20's when sales alarmingly slowed down, Ford couldn't make Model T's fast enough as it was to meet the demand without being saddled with slow drying colors.


Dates as well as Activities might change, Keep a look out for these changes in the News Letter.



Flat-head V-8

Buyers paid an extra \$50 for a V-8 in the 1932 Ford models. Formally called the Ford 18 V-8 Series, it featured a 106-inch wheelbase and weighed a scant 2,398 lbs. But it was the engine under the hood that counted. The new flat-head V-8 displaced 221 cubic inches with a 3.1-inch bore and 3.75-inch stroke. Its compression ratio was 5.5-to-1 to help develop 65 horsepower. By 1936, the compression ratio leaped to 6.3-to-1 with a horsepower rating of 90 on the Ford Model 48s and 85 horsepower on the Model 68s.

DID YOU KNOW?

Have you ever heard of a1932 Model "T"? In 1926 Ford rented a warehouse in Mexico City to build "T" Models. In 1932 the ribbon was cut on a new Ford assemble plant. Shortly thereafter the plant was producing 100 Model "T"s a day, even after the car was discontinued I the USA. Now you know! From "Wheels of the World" Joe Spooner
