


Members met on beautiful morning at Bobby's shop. The wood burning stove was not needed. We enjoyed hot coffee and donuts.

During the past week Bobby and Joe replaced the kingpins on Joe's '30 Model A pickup. They pressed out the old bushings from the spindle assemblies using a 17 mm socket. New bushings were installed and reamed to .812" diameter using the clubs reamer.



We looked at failed headlight wires. These wires and connectors were a mess!



The connectors were replaced by bullet type connectors. They can now be easily disconnected.

Together the group brain stormed possible reasons and solutions as to why Al's "Millie" will not start and run. These reasons will be investigated at Al's garage.

The right side bracket, rubber gasket, bracket backing plate, crossover wire, and dual lite taillight are available at Mike's "A" Ford-ble, and is an easy afternoon installation. While you are at it, why don't you install the LED taillight lenses. These make the taillights super bright and easy to see in modern traffic.

If you did not sign up during the April meeting please email or call me by May 1, 2015. This is very important so we can have an accurate headcount for the caterina.



Model A Q&A'S May 2015

Touring Season is in full swing now. I get several club newsletters from across the southeast and see that everyone is really having fun and their Model A's. Of course there are always things to do on these cars. My advice is to do any fiddling at least a week before a big trip, so you don't get any surprises when you first start out.

Q: I am getting ready to install a new intake/exhaust manifold on my Model A. I have asked several guys in the club for the correct torque for the brass nuts. I have everything from 25 foot-pounds to 65 foot-pounds. What is the correct torque?

A: According to the Chart below. I found that the correct torque setting is 30-35 foot-pounds.

DID YOU KNOW?


The Ford Motor Company has one of the richest histories of any Automobile Company. This was possible because of the preservation of documents, photos, and short films. It is my purpose in the coming months to bring you significant facts of Ford history presented in short "bullets". Please join me in honoring our rich Ford Motor Company History.

FAIR LANE TURNS 100 YEARS OLD

- Fair Lane, the house of Henry and Clara Ford will be turning 100 years old. Located in Dearborn, Michigan, 2 miles from Henry Ford's birthplace.
- The magnificent estate was named in honor of Henry Ford's foster grandfather, Patrick Ahern, born in County Cork Ireland. Fair Lane road lead to the fairgrounds in County Cork Ireland.
- The home had 56 rooms, 7 bedrooms, 8 fireplaces and 16 bathrooms in a 1,300 acre estate. The house had 32,000 square feet and included a Santa's Workshop for Christmas celebrations.
- To encourage Edsel to spend leisure time at the home it included a Bowling alley, billiard room, and swimming pool.
- Construction began in February 1914 and was completed in late1915.
- Completed at a cost of 2.5 million dollars.
- Henry and Clara's favorite room was the sun porch where they would enjoy sunsets over the Rouge River.
- Henry also enjoyed the Power-House and the Garage where he would tinker with his project of the day which could include a watch or a new engine.
- One of the rooms was a library that once contained up to 4,000 books.
- After Clara Ford died in 1950 the estate was taken over by the Ford Motor Company, which established their corporate archives. In 1957 the estate,

210 acres of farmlands and 6.5 million dollars was given to the University of Michigan for construction of their Dearborn Campus.

- In 1966 it was designated as a National Historic Landmark.
- In 2013 ownership of the estate was transferred from the University of Michigan to a newly form 501c3 under the operational umbrella of the Historic Ford Estates which also includes the Edsel and Eleanor Ford House in Gross Pointe Shores, Michigan.
- Fair Lane is currently closed and undergoing an extensive renovation.



Henry Ford was interested in developing plastics from agricultural products like soybeans. With this aim, he developed a relationship with George Washington Carver. Throughout the fourth decade of the twentieth century, plastics obtained from soybean were used in Ford automobiles in plastic parts such as car horns, in paint, etc. In 1942, this project culminated when Ford patented an entirely plastic make automobile. All the plastic parts were attached to a tubular welded frame. Its weight was 30 percent less than of a steel car, and was believed to hold out against blows ten times greater than could steel. Moreover, the car consumed grain alcohol (ethanol) instead of gasoline. The design never caught on. Somehow, this revolutionary contraption never clicked.

Cooling the Model A Ford

Keeping your cool on a warm day

The Model A Ford is truly a Engineering marvel. Hundreds of systems are in place, working together to provide you an enjoyable drive. Each system is simple, so simple in fact that everything must be working to its full potential to provide reliable service. One system on the Model A that seems to draw a lot of attention is the Cooling System. This system involves the radiator, radiator hoses, water pump, fan, and the coolant itself. Most cars will drive for years and years, and never show any kind of problem. But when problems do occur, it's a good idea to have a plan. Recently we had a car in the shop that the customer complained was overheating. He said that any time he drove the car, water would come out of the radiator And splash onto the hood and windshield. We drove the car around our local block, and sure enough water was coming out. However, when we measured the temperature of the engine, it was below 180°. Turned out the problem was with the seal around the radiator ornament. We installed a new \$2 rubber gasket and this took care of the problem. Of course it's not always that easy. If the engine does truly over heat, meaning the temperature is over 200°, then, the radiator could be at fault. First advice is to have the radiator professionally serviced. They can check the coolant flow, and clean any contaminants from the radiator that may be causing problems. If a new radiator is needed, then get one. I know they are expensive, but they are really nice and solve a lot of problems. Next thing to check is the water pump. Problems here are usually noted by water leaking around the seals. The impeller inside the water pump can also be rusted away, preventing water from ciculating. While you are checking the water pump, have a good look at your fan. The original thin steel fans are notorious for cracking near the hub. This will cause a fan blade to eventually


break and fly off, possibly damaging your radiator or hood. Your best bet is to change to an aftermarket aluminum fan. Of course it's a good idea to inspect the hoses. Don't take a chance on old cracked or deteriorated hoses. Same goes for the fan belt. Next, check the coolant. The coolant level should be about even with the "Ford" emblem on the front of the radiator. If you find you are losing a lot of coolant, then you could have a problem inside the engine, however, it is normal to lose a quart or so of coolant on a long drive. Just keep an eye on it and don't let it get too low. It's a good idea to keep an extra gallon of coolant with you.
