It was good to see such a large group of fine people at our last club meeting.


It was especially good to see past members Ann and George Travis.

COVERED BRIDGE TOUR



DATE: June 20, 2015

MEET AT: McDonald's at 7350 Veterans Parkway. (Just before the Porch of the South location but on the East Side of Veterans) Time: 9 a.m. departing at 9:15 a.m.

Travel U.S.27N to Hamilton, then Right on GA 116 Through Pine Mountain valley to Shiloh. Right on Old Shiloh Road to U.S. 85. Left on 85 N to Manchester, through downtown Manchester to GA 173 and PHOTO OP at ______ Church. Then on to GA 18 turning right and short distance to intersection with GA Alt 85. Left on GA Alt 85 to Imlac (2 miles North of Woodbury). Then Right on Imlac Road to Red Oak Creek Covered Bridge.

Note: Red Oak Covered Bridge – Sometimes called Imlac Covered Bridge was built in the 1840's of the town lattice construction and has been well maintained. The Bridge is 252.5 feet in length and you may drive yur "A" through the bridge for a great PHOTO OP....

Then it's back to Woodbury for a

We continue South on GA 85 to Manchester again, drive through part of Manchester and on to Warm Springs and lunch at the Bullock House. Need

tentative head count for lunch. Following Lunch and some more "tire kicking". We are off to Duand on Model A Roads and a brief stop to view another old and beautiful church. Next on to Pine Mountain of GA 18 and through Callaway Gardens to Tip Top GA for a brief Nature Stop at the Callaway Country Store. Tip Top GA: Ask Al Lugo to show you his 1931 Gulf Road Map.

We will be traveling Model A two lane roads with excellent scenery Since most of the tour is on two lane roads, you must maintain a safe distance from the car ahead. (suggest no less than 10 - 12 car lengths).

Good idea to take spare parts (even the wrong ones), some extra water for the A and extra fuel will not be necessary since there will be several possible fuel opportunities if needed.

Model A Q&A'S June 2015

We never get tired of Model A's. We see a broad range of cars from barn finds, to the high point show cars. I've seen skeletons of cars left in the woods, and I've seen Model A's which have been lovingly cared for, since they were new, still with the original paint and upholstery. Each car has its own personality, kind of like their owners. What a fun hobby. Here are some questions from the shop, hope you find the information helpful.

Q: The clutch in my 1929 Tudor really chatters when I'm pulling out of the driveway. Is there an easy way to fix this? Or do I need a new clutch?

A: If the car has been sitting for a long time, there is a possibility that there is a little rust on the pressure plate or flywheel, and the chattering may go away after you drive it a few **miles. But if this chattering has been going on for a long time, then it's probably time for a** new clutch. Unfortunately, this is a big job, which will require removing the transmission. As you know, the Model A also has a closed driveshaft, so you also have to move the rear end back a few inches to get the transmission out. Now remove the pressure plate, and flywheel. Have the flywheel machined at your local machine shop. Pressure plates are available new. Be sure and replace the pilot bearing, and throw out bearing. Check the ring gear on the flywheel too, this would be the time to change it if needed. There is a procedure to test the alignment of the flywheel housing to the flywheel, but I will not have time to go into that here. If everything is done right, then your clutch will be silky smooth for years to come.

Q: I am currently restoring a 1931 Deluxe Roadster. We really want to drive the car so I am wondering if I should go with a high speed rear end gear.

A: After doing some quick searching on the Internet I found four different ratios for Model **A's.** Looks like almost all cars came with a 3.78:1. Pick-up trucks came with 4.11:1. Some very early 1928 cars came with 3.7:1. Roadsters came with 3.54:1, this is what we usually

referred to as a High Speed gear. This would be great for a light car, such as your Roadster. **Mike's also sells an Extra High Speed gear which is a 3.27:1. He warns you must** have a strong engine to run this gear. I have never had any experience with this gear, but it might be worth a try.

Q: Which safety items do you suggest keeping in the car for long trips?

A: I received two phone calls within a week from Model A owners who actually have their cars catch on fire. Fortunately, no one got hurt, and the vehicles were not damaged. However, I have seriously changed my mind concerning fire safety. Here are my thoughts: all cars should be equipped with a Safety Fuse Kit. PN# A11450SF. This will provide safety against electrical fires. Next item is an Air Maze Flame Arrestor, A9600Z. This will prevent a carburetor fire. Now get yourself a small fire extinguisher to keep in the car. Stay safe out there.



DID YOU KNOW?

The Ford Motor Company has one of the richest histories of any Automobile Company. This was possible because of the preservation of documents, photos, and short films. It is my purpose in the coming months to bring you significant facts of Ford history presented in short "bullets". Please join me in honoring our rich Ford Motor Company History.

HENRY FORD'S LEGACY IN GEORGIA

- In 1930 Ford purchased over 70,000 acres near a town called Ways Station, Georgia.
- In 1936 Ford began construction on a Greek revival-style residence made of Savannah gray brick facing the Ogeechee river. He named the place Richmond Hill. Later in 1941 the town of Ways Station was named Richmond Hill.
- Today it is part of the centerpiece of 1,800-acre Ford Plantation, a private community whose members may house guests at the Ford residence.
- At one time Clara Ford had \$150,000 worth of china and silver at this home.
- The Ford's were involved members of the community, building a church, helping also to eradicate malaria by bringing medical personnel and draining low-lying lands to inhibit mosquito infestation which caused the disease. He also built schools for both black and white children and provided health care for everybody of both races.
- He would get his haircut at the local barber shop. The chair he used to sit on is displayed at the Richmond Hill History Museum.
- His influence in Georgia also extended to Berry College near Rome, Georgia. In 1921 Edison introduced him to Martha Berry. She asked

Ford for a tractor for the College. Over the next two decades he would purchase many tractors and other vehicles for the school.

- Among the buildings at Berry College is the gothic Ford Complex and the Clara Hall named for Mrs. Ford. All of these were built with funds donated by the Ford's. Ford never wanted recognition for his donations.
- Ford also created dormitories, a dining hall, classrooms, an auditorium and many other facilities needed at Berry College.
- He was so involved with Berry College since Ford and Martha Berry were both devoted to educating poor children.
- Henry Ford died only a little more than a week after his last visit to Martha Berry College in 1947.

Although Ford is famous for revolutionizing the automobile industry, the company's successful foray into civil aviation is much less well known. In 1926, the company began production of the 4-AT, a three-engine aircraft also known as the Ford Trimotor or, because of its corrugated metal fuselage, the "Tin Goose." The Trimotor was the largest American civil aircraft when it debuted, and most major airlines flew the plane during the 1920s and 30s. Production of the Trimotor ceased in 1933.
