




MATTS

February Meeting

Although several of our members were gone to the Moultrie swap meet we had a good turnout for the February MATTS meeting.



Bobby passed out an article by Tony Topicz describing a simple method to bench test a capacitor. Any gasoline engine can be used in this check. Be sure to use insulated alligator clips. Also from firsthand experience 5 mil blue nitrile gloves available locally do not give adequate protection against the high voltage produced by the ignition circuit of a gasoline engine. (Having a problem reading the article, just increase your size or zoom out)

Spark Plugs:

Club members present agree Champion W-18 spark plugs give the best all-around Model A performance. These plugs are available at NAPA stores.




Joe and Bobby displayed homemade dipsticks that can be used to check the accuracy of '30 - '31 dashboard fuel gages. These dipsticks are also useful in measuring engine efficiency and gasoline used during tours, etc. An example is the results of a 74 mile tour by Motor Cities Region in 2007:

The highest MPG was 19.876 mpg for a 1930 Town sedan.

The lowest MPG was 13.638 mpg for a 1930 Tudor

Two pneumatic cutting tools were shown and passed around. The nibbler and small 3" diameter grinder with a thin .075" abrasive wheel are ideal for cutting light gage metal used in Model A bodies. The nibbler seems as if it would be ideal for non-flame cutting of access holes to be used for cleaning the inside of gas tanks.



An auto-darkening welding helmet was also passed around. This has been a great help in starting a new weld! Have you ever started a weld bead only to find it was not just where you wanted it?



The Planning Meeting


































PART 2 LETTERS FROM HOME

SERVICE LETTER # 2 February 15, 1928 Page 4, Para Four

FRONT BODY BOLTS - The front bolts are left out intentionally on all Tudors and Coupes and will be emitted on Fordors. On account of the solid roof construction, it is necessary to provide for a slight flexing of the body when the car is driven over rough roads. The omission of these bolts distributes the strain so it is not all taken up in the body construction. The Phaeton, Roadster, and Sport Coupe have the front body bolts installed...

SERVICE LETTER #3 February 23, 1928 Page 1 Para 3

Closed Body Assembly - The windows on closed cars have a tendency to slightly lower when the car is in motion; it will be in order for you to remove the regulator handle and reassemble it on the regulator so that the handle is on a downward motion when windows are closed tight. This will prevent the weight of the handle from lowering the window when shaken by the motion of the car...

ASSEMBLY CHANGE AND SERVICE DEPARTMENT LETTER #4 - Front Radius Rod - If necessary to reassemble a front radius rod, it is very important to see that the ball cap bolt sleeve A-3435 is in place on each bolt. This sleeve prevents the springs being fully compressed when the nuts are tightened. If these sleeves are not in place, the radius rod ball will be clamped very solidly between the ball caps, thus preventing it from having a natural motion with the action of the front spring. This condition can cause a possible fracture...

It is my purpose in the coming months to bring you significant facts of Ford history presented in short "bullets". Please join me in honoring our rich Ford Motor Company History.

HENRY FORD AND TRADE SCHOOL

Most people did not realize that Henry Ford was also famous for establishing trade schools.
These schools were started October 25, 1916, with six students and one instructor. These
schools did a great job preparing youth for the work place, in particular in the automotive
Industry, teaching them also classes in English, history, chemistry and physics.

- By 1931 the school's enrollment reached 2,800 students with 135 instructors. The first school
 opened on Woodward Avenue in Highland Park and later relocated to the Ford Rouge
 Complex in Dearborn. Ford also opened 54 other education facilities throughout the United
 States, Canada and Europe.
- The schools mission was to give boys an opportunity to help support themselves, learning a trade, that would be useful in their adult life.
- Henry Ford's objective was to make the students use their hands and their heads.
- At the Rouge Complex students worked in the die, gage, forge, carpentry, sheet metal, tool repair, nickel plating, wood pattern, and metal patterns.
- The schools were a non-profit enterprise. Scholarships were awarded and given to the young men and needy children. In 1935, 5% of the students were orphans and 40% of the students had father's that were not able to support the family. The cost for all the training was provided by Ford.
- These trade schools were also very critical during World War II and helped to win the war, when skilled tradesmen, trained by Ford, taught 200,000 army, navy machinists, airman and women at the factory that helped produced the B-24 airplane at the Willow Run plant.
- The schools closed in 1952, with more than 8,000 tradesmen trained during the 33 years of enrolment.
