

Come join us on the first Friday of each month at Bobby's shop for fellowship, hot coffee and doughnuts, while learning about the Model A's.

We discussed how the "Key Ring" type timing aid presented at last month's MATTS meeting function.



Al Lugo describes how the new Timing Calibration Tool he purchased permits locating the detent and position of the timing gear. This timing gear position corresponds to the TDC (Top dead Center) location of Number 1 piston before timing of the distributor can begin.



The timing calibration Tool sometimes referred as a Timing Indication Tool is available from large Model A parts suppliers. Al got his from Bratton' Antique Auto Parts, PN 7893.



Thread the tool into the timing Gear Case until the key ring on the end starts to loosen. Now rotate the motor with the hand crank until the key ring flops as it falls into the detent on the timing gear. This indicates TDC of Number 1 piston and you are now ready to time the distributor.


> The hand tool is shown with the timing gear detent. This detent may be quite shallow requiring slow rotation of the motor so the detent is not misse

DID YOU KNOW?

The Ford Motor Company has one of the richest histories of any Automobile Company. This was possible because of the preservation of documents, photos, and short films. It is my purpose in the coming months to bring you significant facts of Ford history presented in short "bullets". Please join me in honoring our rich Ford Motor Company History.



The Ford Model "A" and "AA" Mail Truck

- After recognizing the need for a Central Post Office Department, Benjamin Franklin was appointed as the first Postmaster General of the Continental Congress.
- At first mail would be moved in the most efficient manner. This included horseback, ships, rail, and when the airplane was invented even by airplane.
- After the automobile was invented, many different, non-standard vehicles were used. In 1927, Harry S. New, the Postmaster General, appointed by President Harding, reported to Congress that 85% of the Post Office vehicles were nonstandard vehicles that basically were received from the War Department. He recommended that a fleet of standard trucks be purchased to reduce the cost to the tax payer. They would be maintained by regional maintenance shops that used standardized parts.
- Two types of vehicles were to be constructed to meet the mission of the Postal Department. The two missions were number one Collection and Delivery Service and number two Screen Wagon Service.
- The Collection and Delivery service was used to collect mail from mail boxes, delivering parcel post, transporting carriers to and from their mail routes. For this mission they would commission 100 cubic foot bodies, the Ford Model A Ford Mail Truck. The second mission, the Screen Wagon Service was to be used to transport mail between post offices, postal stations, railroad stations and points where bulk mail is received or sent. For this mission they would commission 200 cubic foot bodies, the Ford AA Mail Truck.
- In May of 1929 a bid was placed to purchase standard trucks. The Ford Motor Company provided the standard four cylinder engine and ½ ton chassis (103 ½ wheelbase) with a load capacity of 1800 pounds. This would be the Ford Model A Mail Truck. The wood bodies were then built by other contractors and mounted on the Ford chassis.
- Three different companies were contracted by the Postal Service to build the standard Mail Trucks bodies for the 3 car companies that would build Mail Trucks. The companies building mail truck bodies were York-Hoover of York, Pennsylvania, Mifflinburg Body Corporation of Mifflinburg, Pennsylvania and General Woodworking Corporation.

- In 1929 the Ford Model A Mail truck would total 1400 trucks. York Hoover would build 900 bodies for Ford and Mifflinburg Body Corporation would build the remaining 500 bodies.
- York Hoover would also build 400 Mail Trucks for Chevrolet and General Woodworking Corporation would build 1000 bodies for Hudson/Essex.
- The Ford Model AA Postal Truck was built on the four cylinder 1 ton chassis that had a 131 ½ wheelbase and a load capacity of 4200 pounds. The number of Ford Model AA trucks was 2900. These were built by three companies. August Schubert Wagon Works of Syracuse, New York, built 400 bodies for Ford. Metropolitan Body Company of Bridgeport, Connecticut, built 1000 bodies for Ford and General Motors Truck Division of Pontiac, Michigan, built 1500 bodies for Ford.
- Two other companies built bodies for Chevrolet with 4200 pound capacity. The Weatherproof Body Corporation built 400 bodies for Chevrolet and General Motors Truck Division built 550 bodies for Chevrolet.
- Ford built Ford Model A Mail Trucks in 1929 and 1931. Some of the 1931 trucks had 1932 Ford parts. Ford built Ford Model AA Mail Trucks also in 1929 and in 1931.
- Before the contract, the Postal Service used mainly WWI surplus vehicles. The government had a large amount of surplus olive green paint, because of this olive green would be the color of the Model A and AA Mail truck. The Postal Department also wanted the wood bodies painted with a brush.
- These trucks were used up to the 1950's because during WWII there were very few nonmilitary vehicles available to build Mail vehicles.



Hello All, I have recently run across a tire company here in LaGrange that can spin balance our Model A tires as well as mount split ring truck/tractor tires.

I thought maybe you could put their information in the newsletters if anyone might be interested.

I loaned them a wheel and they figured out how to do it. For them it was just a matter of using the right mandrels that they had available. Ask for Major, a young man who was on our Little League baseball team.

By the way, I was at their shop getting valve stems inserted in a couple more wheels so I can run my tires tubeless. I have tried this on several tires on numerous Greatraces with no problems (several thousand miles). If you have good powder coated wheels you should have no problems. Occasionally a spoke might have a real slow leak, but this can be corrected with a little sealing caulk.

Skipper Barfield shares an experience with his Model T

I had a Model T expert drive to Columbus from Florida and "get my T running." He is a retired fireman from NY State who now lives near Panama City,

FL. He got it running and we heard all the noise coming from inside the engine so he pulled the head and front covers. The 92 year old engine had never been overhauled. It had the original 2 piece valves. He asked me to trailer it to Florida where he would pull the engine and send it to Texas so a babbitt shop could "short block" it. I called Paul Singer to tell him I had finally begun to take action toward getting our Ford Model T on the road again. Paul said he had his Model A engine done and was well pleased. I asked who and he told me Perry Swanson in Douglas, GA. I have trailered our T to Douglas, had the total tour of his babbit service and saw the fine Ford Model A's and Model T's that he has. This man is truly the expert in our entire region having a babbitt service. I even saw the pouring of the babbit process and the machining that follows. Precision stuff. I attach two pictures here, one of his Model A huckster in which he just completed a 2,600 mile trip. The Great Race, and an image of his card which is a great resource.
